INFORMATION AND FORMS AVAILABLE

At the beginning of each school year, we are all deluged with forms and information. In an effort to minimize paper use, save money and attempt to simply the process of starting our students on the path to a new school year, we are not mailing several forms needed only by a few families. These forms will be available in the main office.

One form we are not mailing is the form parents can sign if they DO NOT want information about their student provided to military recruiters. This form only needs to be signed one time during the student's four years at SEHS. If you have already signed this form, there is NO NEED to sign it again.

Also, we have LTD forms in the office for parents to sign if they DO NOT want their student to receive free bus passes this year. All students will receive stickers allowing free bus passes on their student body card unless a parent signs this form. If students need their free bus pass prior to registration, they can pick up a temporary card in the SEHS office.

In addition, forms are available in the main office for ordering Lifetouch photos at registration. The form describes a number of package options for ordering photos. These forms will also be available at registration. Students can pay Lifetouch by check or credit card.

CORRECTION ARENA SET FOR AUGUST 31

Student schedules were sent the week of August 17 to the mailing address of all students who did not have unpaid fees or fines. If you have not received a schedule, please make arrangements to clear your account in the Finance Office as soon as possible.

For the Correction Arena on Monday, August 31, students need the following information:

- Schedules with errors and/or missing classes will be taken care of at the Correction Arena on Monday, August 31st. (seniors at 10:00 a.m., juniors at 10:45 p.m., sophomores at 11:30 a.m., freshman at 12:15 p.m.)
- Seniors need to be cautious when dropping classes that may jeopardize graduation or college entrance requirements. Check with your counselor before dropping a class.
- Athletes need to be enrolled and passing 5 classes to be eligible to play any sport. Fall sports will go on 08-09 second semester grades.

Requested schedule changes will be subject to both teacher recommendations and space availability. Please be on time and prepared with your paper copy of your schedule. If you are unable to attend Correction Arena on August 31, your request may be submitted during the first week of September before school begins. If you cannot attend Correction Arena on August 31, please schedule a September appointment with your academic counselor or an assistant principal.

Students wishing to switch periods or teachers will need to pick up a yellow request form (available in the Counseling Center) on Monday 9/14. Completed request forms will be due back no later than Tuesday 9/15 by 4:00 p.m. to have your request considered. A list of student numbers will be posted outside the Counseling Center showing whose requests have been approved on Friday 9/18, and revised schedules will be available at this time.

Dear South Eugene Families,

The dawn of a new school year is always filled with excitement. Students look forward to reconnecting with friends while also exploring new classes and opportunities that will be the ingredients for a memorable year. As students return, we look forward to building on the reputation of high achievement for which South Eugene High School is well known.



I'd like to welcome our ninth grade students and families, as well as others who are new to SEHS. We encourage your students to participate in a healthy balance of coursework and extracurricular activities that we offer. The core curriculum is geared to a broad spectrum of interests and skill levels, and students have a rich variety of elective courses from which to choose. At South Eugene, we firmly believe that all students can achieve at high levels. We understand students require varying levels of skills training and support to meet their goals. Consequently, we are enriching or expanding programs that will provide students with skills they'll need to be successful in high school and ready for college. All Classic South freshmen will have an Advisory class that teaches study skills in addition to other topics (see related article). We will continue to offer academic support classes both during and after school. Furthermore, many content area teachers will be expanding and deepening their focus on college readiness skills such as critical thinking, reading comprehension, note taking, and collaborative learning.

New courses and programs will add to this solid foundation. Our English and Social Studies departments are offering several new semester-long courses. Other new courses include Environmental Studies and Advanced Placement Comparative Government. In addition, IHS freshmen will be enrolled in more extensive health coursework than in the past.

Of course, new programs are not the only ingredients for success. Joining our talented staff are several new members who are eager to work with our students: Physics teacher - Asher Tubman; Orchestra teacher - Shira Fadeley; Librarians - Angela Ross and Richard Thompson, and Technology Support Specialist - James Murray. We gladly welcome these educators to SEHS.

"COLLEGE NOW" OPTION AVAILABLE

The College Now program of Lane Community College allows high school students to earn dual credit. They can get college credits, at no cost, for approved courses taken right here at SEHS. In addition to counting toward degree programs at LCC, these college credits transfer to most other two- and four-year colleges and universities, including all those located in Oregon. Approved College Now courses at South include some levels of Spanish, AP/IB French, Journalism, AP Literature, several Art and Computer classes, Child Psychology, and Catering classes. There may be more added to this list. We appreciate the teachers who have taken the time to articulate their courses with LCC instructors so that this benefit is available to our students.

ATTENDANCE IS REQUIRED

For students to be successful, it's very important that they attend classes unless they have a legitimate reason for being absent. SEHS staff will continue to enforce attendance policies focused on unexcused absences. First, students need to know that it is a violation of school rules and state law to skip class. When we discover that students have skipped classes, parents are notified, and we assign disciplinary consequences that range from lunch detention to after-school detention to referral to the Lane County Attendance Officer.

We also have a prearranged absence policy. The prearranged absence form is available in our main office and is also linked to the SEHS website's home page. Students must present this form to their teacher at least two days in advance of their absence. Teachers will apply criteria, including the length and purpose of the absence, to decide whether or not to excuse it.

Teachers award only partial credit to students who accrue five or more unexcused absences in a course. PARENTS, YOU CAN HELP by promptly calling in excused absences to our attendance office, 790-8008, and by working with the school to encourage your student to attend every class unless she/he is ill or is otherwise excused for a doctor's appointment, family emergency, or religious holiday. Thank you!

ROTARY PROVIDES OPPORTUNITY FOR STUDENTS TO STUDY ABROAD

Rotary Clubs of Eugene and Springfield are seeking applicants who would like to become exchange students under the Rotary Youth Exchange Program. Students selected for the program will study in a foreign country for one year at a pre-university level. The program is open to high school students who are in the upper half of their class scholastically, who will be 16 years old and not more than 18 at the time of departure.

ALGEBRA 1: ASSESSMENT, EXPECTATIONS, AND SUPPORT

It is common knowledge that a solid understanding of Algebra 1 is a gateway to success in high school and college. Math teachers in 4J have been working hard to prepare for full implementation of an Algebra program that features a common set of assessments throughout the district. The expectation is that students must pass each of sixteen "concept tests" in order to earn a passing grade in the course. By holding this high expectation and supporting it with additional instruction as needed, we aspire to have all of our Algebra students pass the course and build a solid math foundation. This will prove to be an asset as they enroll in higher-level math and science classes and will also help students meet the math requirement they need to graduate high school.

Regardless of where a student attends middle or high school, each and every concept test must be passed in order to earn credit for Algebra 1. Because we want every SEHS Algebra 1 student to be successful in this course, any student who does not pass a test will be required to attend after-school support sessions the following week. A South Eugene Algebra teacher will provide further instruction and the opportunity to retake the exam. When the student passes the test, the higher score will count toward the final course grade. We are optimistic that this system of proficiency-based instruction will help all of our students reach their math potential.

PARENT COUNCIL LEAPS FORWARD

We believe South is one of Oregon's most successful high schools, yet even the happiest students might have a few complaints. Avoidable pressures? Too much wasted time? Perhaps you've heard an insightful comment or two, comments that really shouldn't be ignored.

This year Parent Council will adopt a more activist role by serving as an important advisor to Site Council, the school's policy-making organization. Throughout the year Parent Council will discuss concerns at South, explore potential solutions, and make specific recommendations to Site Council.

Parent Council will meet the last Wednesday of each month, beginning September 30th, and continue through May, except November and December. Meetings will start at 8 p.m. in the school cafeteria, and will end when the last person leaves (usually by 9 p.m.) - just stay however long you'd like.

Each meeting will begin with a brief update from Principal Randy Bernstein about noteworthy changes at South. Next, we'll quickly make decisions, if any, about initiatives that Parent Council sponsors (see related story). And last, we'll roll up our sleeves, share what we hear from our teens, and figure out ways South could better support life, learning and happiness. HANDBOOKS AND COURSE EXPECTATIONS WILL BE DISTRIBUTED IN CLASSES

During the first week of classes, our teachers will be reviewing important information and materials with students, including the Student/Parent Handbooks. These contain information regarding available services, behavioral expectations, and required procedures. Parents, please be sure to review this document with your student. Also, teachers will be expecting students to share their course syllabi and expectation forms with you. We recommend that you make a copy of these to keep at home for future reference.

RESERVED PARKING CHANGE

Change is coming to the SEHS parking lot! In the past, students have purchased specific parking spaces. With that privilege have come hundreds of complaints each year about cars parked illegally or in the wrong spaces. Our administrative and security staffs have had to deal with parking issues on a daily basis.

Because of budget cuts, both administrative and security staff hours have been reduced. We will not be able to devote the amount of attention to parking issues as in the past. We understand that change from one system to another can be difficult. Last year, as district budget cuts were announced, we looked for ways to decrease parking lot infractions. At the suggestion of several students, the concept of zoned parking was brought to our Site Council for consideration. During that process we learned that zoned parking is not new to South, as several alumni recalled from their own high school experience. And, in fact, zoned parking at South more closely reflects similar real world parking arrangements in use at businesses and colleges. With the Site Council's permission, we are converting the parking lot arrangement to zoned parking as follows:

Students will be able to choose one of five zones in which to park. The zones will be identified by color, and signs will be posted to guide drivers to the appropriate parking zone. There will be three designated zones in the east parking lot and two zones in the west lot. In this way, students will have more choice of parking spots within a specific zone. Permit stickers will be displayed in a uniform manner, on the rear bumper of the vehicle or on the rear window, so the security staff can monitor the parking lots more efficiently. Parking stickers will be available for \$50 per vehicle in the finance office after September 2, or during registration.

We are confident that changing to a zonal system will be more equitable and will free up spaces that would otherwise sit empty for all or part of a day.

Also, if you haven't updated your card since your student was in middle school, you need to change your group selection to South Eugene High School, group # 6781184.*

No need to purchase different scrip coupons for individual stores. Use them just like cash. Unique Eugene is sold in \$10 increments. SENIORS WORK TOWARD GRADUATION

Classic South seniors who are not in a CAM program satisfy Oregon's "extended application graduation requirement" by completing the Senior Project. This connects twelfth graders to their community, while providing them with an authentic opportunity to think critically about potential career choices. A majority of these students wisely began this project by completing their 25-hour community experience over the summer. This may have been an internship, mentorship, or community service project. If they have not yet begun, they'll be assisted in their Senior Project class to find a placement for this experience.

All Senior Project students will develop a portfolio and rehearse a 15 - 20 minute exhibition, which they'll present to a panel of three evaluators plus guests. During the first semester, we will assign students to a seminar class where they will meet with a teacher who will guide them through this project. Students will earn a .25 credit for this project, which must meet established standards in order to graduate from high school. These community-based placements followed by public exhibitions result in the kind of genuine learning experiences we wish to provide our students at South. Many of our graduates have reported that the Senior Project was one of their most worthwhile experiences at SEHS!
