CLINIC WARNS OF CHICKEN POX; OFFERS PHYSICALS

Your child may have been exposed to chickenpox at school. You may wish to consult your physician if surgery or hospitalization is being planned for anyone in your family, as chicken pox can be considered a potential risk for hospital populations.

Immunization is now available for chicken pox. Contact your physician's office for more information. Some children (about 10-15%) might still get chicken pox after receiving the vaccine, but the illness will be much milder, with less risk of complications and hospitalization.

Chicken pox is an acute, generalized viral disease that begins suddenly with mild symptoms, which include signs of

a cold, fever and a blistery rash. Watch for these symptoms 10 to 21 days from exposure (usually 13 to 17 days), and if the symptoms occur, keep your child at home and call your doctor promptly for diagnosis and treatment options.

With early notification, the doctor may be able to prescribe something to lessen the illness, as well as instruct you about comfort measures and complications to watch for. **DO NOT GIVE ASPIRIN** or aspirin containing products due to the increased risk of Reye's syndrome in children under 18 years old. Children may return to school after all lesions are crusted, usually about seven days after the rash first appears.

Please notify us if you find out your child does have chicken pox. Feel free to contact the school health clinic at 687-3209, if you have questions.

Also, if your student is in need of a physical, they are available at the SEHS Health Center. They will bill your insurance and offer a sliding scale for those without insurance. They no longer do sports physicals but they do offer a comprehensive wellness exam that is considered the best standard of care for adolescents.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear South Eugene Families and Friends,

First, I want to congratulate the great majority of our students who worked so diligently to develop their skills, deepen their knowledge, and earn solid grades during first semester. We are proud of our students who continue to excel in all of our academic and extracurricular programs.



The new Oregon graduation requirements present issues of which we would like all parents and students to be well aware. There are three sets of requirements affecting our current and incoming high school students. The first is the set of Career Related Learning Standards (CRLS), which must be met by all students beginning with our current senior class. The final portion of the CRLS calls for students to “demonstrate extended application through a collection of evidence.” IHS and CAM students meet this requirement through experiences previously built into their programs. The rest of our Classic South seniors have been engaged in a new Senior Project, which takes the form of authentic, hands-on experiences that connect them to our community while enhancing their sense of what they may wish to pursue after graduating from South. At this time, most seniors have completed and presented their project and have found it to be one of the more meaningful high school experiences. Unfortunately, some students have put this off, and their graduation status is currently in question. Parents of juniors please be looking for dates and times of Senior Project meetings that we’ll soon be sending out. These will take place in April and will provide you and your students with information about how they can get started early on this important Senior Project.

A second set of requirements is in effect for the current freshman class and all those that follow. For students in 4J, these increase the Math requirement from 2 years of credit to 3, the English requirement from 3.5 to 4, and the overall credit requirement from 23 to 24.

Finally, the Oregon State Board of Education approved a third set of requirements on January 18. For the 4J class of 2012 (current 7th graders), these include 3 years credit of science instead of 2, and 3 years combined credit in Arts/Second Language/Professional Technical Education instead of 2. For the class of 2014 (current 5th graders), the 3 years of math must all be at the Algebra 1 level and above, and proficiency in a set of “Essential Skills” will need to be demonstrated.

As you can guess, just as our staff is working to effectively complete implementation of the first two sets of standards, we will also need to be gearing up for the newest graduation requirements. These are intended, of course, to better prepare all students for success in their lives beyond high school. Our fine staff is up to the task of preparing for these additional elements, but now more than ever; we also need support in terms of resources. High schools in Eugene meanwhile, are experiencing a decline in enrollment, which translates to a reduction in staffing at SEHS and other schools next year. District 4J will provide what state and local resources they can, but we need to turn directly to our parents, once again, for your help.

Earlier this year, I asked parents to help us reach a goal of \$80,000 in contributions to South through our Eugene Education Fund. This would provide for about five classroom sections and seems realistic, given that the middle schools in our region collect at least this amount while having a combined student population that is just about two-thirds of our size. Thus far this year, we are grateful to those families who have helped us raise approximately \$33,000. We still have quite a way to go, so another letter will be sent out in a few weeks, as we know that many families prefer to make their contributions at this time of year. We appreciate whatever support you can provide.

When we work together, we can achieve great things. This year’s Senior Project is one example. Meanwhile, new programs like our Academic Support Center and Freshman Math Block are contributing to significantly improved GPA’s and passing rates for our ninth grade class. With your help we can maintain and even enhance South’s reputation of academic excellence.

INVITATION FOR SEHS STUDENTS

It is not too late to decide to join us this summer in France!

From our home near Notre Dame, we will take full advantage of Paris, the vibrant and cosmopolitan capital known as the “city of lights.” No matter how much you have studied history, the arts, or culture, you will find yourself intrigued about the life of Paris, a city that offers you fresh perspectives for learning and endless stimulation for creativity.

Paris is a rite, an aspiration, a dream! Our daily program will include guided visits to all the places that a person living in Paris for a week must not fail to visit. Some will be obvious: a tour of the Louvre, a stroll around the Luxembourg Gardens, a promenade down the Champs-Élysées, a visit to the Rodin Museum, an exploration of the Musée D’Orsay. But others might seem less so, such as an afternoon of bookstores, cafés, student life in the Latin Quarter, watching a Pétanque game, joining in on a soccer game in the Tuilerie Gardens, an avant-garde exhibition at the Centre Pompidou, or going to a classic French film in the student quarter. Unforgettable events such as these add a unique dimension to the students’ impression and understanding of Parisian life.

The program will include a visit to the French Alps and to Chamonix, a smaller town. We will get a feel for the “other” France. There is so much to explore on the narrow, cobblestone streets. At the foot of Mt. Blanc, we can hike the alpine meadows, take a gondola ride over a glacier into Italy, ride the summer luge, or shop at the famous ski resort’s boutiques. We will be staying in a chalet overlooking the mountains.

COUNSELING CENTER AND COLLEGE/ CAREER CENTER

SENIORS

Senior interviews with counselors are mostly complete. If you have not yet had yours, counselors can't verify that you're ready for graduation. -Sign up with Melinda in the Counseling Center.

Look over your 1st semester grades and transcript to make sure you're in good standing for graduation. If unsure of your status, make an appointment with your counselor.

Seniors who attended seminar classes and completed Senior Projects presentations during first semester should be applauded for their initiative and out-of-school learning in this first year of the Oregon state CRLS Extended Application. Many have impressed the panelists as they exhibited learning experiences beyond their usual class work. Seniors who are still wrapping up their hours and portfolios should present in Exhibitions scheduled for March 1st and 2nd. Those enrolled in a second semester senior seminar class will present in April.

For seniors still working on college applications, you can see a list of colleges with rolling admissions (still taking applications) in the College/Career Center. We also have information on great choices among Oregon Community Colleges.

It is FAFSA season! It's time to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid. Apply online at fafsa.ed.gov; worksheets are available in the College/Career Center.

Seniors, as you hear from colleges, please go into Naviance to report the results. This information anonymously contributes to the SEHS college admissions data available to future seniors as they decide where to apply. Go to "my colleges" and click on "edit" to enter the type of application and the result. Naviance registration codes can be picked up in the College/Career Center.

JUNIORS

If you haven't already signed up for a Junior Interview with your counselor, now is the time. Sign up with Melinda in the Counseling Center for an appointment time by Spring Break. This is a required part of graduation planning. IHS students should bring their Junior Project to the interview; counselors already have the project packets of Classic South students.

Naviance Family Connection is South's web-based program to help students and families with post-high school planning, and communication with counselors. If you haven't registered yet, get your registration code in the College/Career Center. Parent codes are available also.

Juniors who are planning to attend 4-year college may want to take the SAT or ACT test in March-June. Registration deadlines are a month or more earlier. Find information and test schedules in the College/Career Center or online at collegeboard.com and

act.org.

Senior Project is coming! Classic South juniors will meet with counselors this spring to learn about and begin to plan their Senior Projects. A popular option is to 'Jump Start' by doing the project during the summer, to present in the fall. Watch for meeting dates to be set in April. IHS students fulfill this requirement through their IHS Senior Project.

SOPHOMORE

Sophomores have been completing their Sophomore Projects career exploration in the College/Career Center. If you haven't yet, come in during your free period, lunch, or late start Wednesday morning.

Sophomore interviews begin in March. Sign up for an appointment in the College/Career Center.

FRESHMEN

Ninth graders are coming to the College/Career Center to begin their career exploration piece of post-high school planning, using the exploration tool, IDEAS. They are scheduled through their Peer Group or IHS Projects classes.

Counselor Travis Johnson will visit with all freshman classes in March to go over students' 4-year graduation plans.

ASAP

This spring the peer educator program will be piloting two additional days of Aids and Substance Abuse Prevention (ASAP) Curriculum in the sophomore American Studies classes. As with the first week of ASAP instruction, junior and senior peer educators will facilitate discussions, lead activities, and distribute information that helps sophomores develop standards and skills for a healthy life style. In response to sophomore evaluations of the program, this new spring component of ASAP will specifically address issues related to substance use.

Training for the junior and senior peer educators will take place on the afternoon of March 2nd, as this is an early release day. We will be contacting ASAP leaders about that training. If your son or daughter was an ASAP leader, please encourage their participation. We appreciate your support for this exciting program.

AP tests: Students planning to take AP tests may sign up and pay fees on March 13 & 14 at the Finance Office. The fee for each exam is \$82.; make check payable to "SEHS AP." Test dates are May 7 through May 17 and held at Emerald Baptist Church unless otherwise directed. For questions contact Laurene Larson, AP Coordinator, at 687-3213.

NEWS FROM THE SEHS LIBRARY

The library will be collecting those books for a "Thank you, Class of 2007" display in June. We are also running

a bookplate design contest in the spring and will choose a winning creation to be printed and placed in all the gift books.

In March, seniors will be receiving notification of any library materials and fines due. Please encourage your student to take care of those as soon as possible. Doing so will smooth the way to graduation and eliminate one of the possible stresses during a very busy time of the year. The new online catalog allows students to check their record from any computer with Internet access. Simply go to the SEHS Library web page and click on the "via" symbol. Then click on "My Library Account" and enter name and student number. Students are welcome to inquire at the circulation desk about their account.

ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT REMINDER

The athletic department wants to remind parents and student athletes that South Eugene High School has a certified athletic trainer (ATC) on site. Certified athletic trainers are educated in injury recognition, evaluation, management, and rehabilitation. Athletic trainers are certified through the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA) and must obtain continuing education units to maintain certification. In addition, certified athletic trainers in the state of Oregon, must maintain registration requirements with the Oregon Health Licensing Agency.

Our athletic trainer is in contact with other area athletic trainers, school nurses, physicians, and physical therapists so that appropriate referrals can be made when necessary. The athletic trainer will stay in contact with everyone involved in the care of the injury, including parents and coaches, to assure a safe return to play.

What to do if your student athlete gets injured:

- Before an injury occurs, encourage your student athlete to meet the athletic trainer and become familiar with the athletic training room.

If an injury occurs, have your student athlete evaluated by the athletic trainer before returning to activity.

- A determination of how the injury should be managed will be made during the evaluation, including necessary referrals and recommendations on returning to participation.
- The student athlete should continue to follow up with the athletic trainer for rehabilitation until released to full participation.
- Parents/Guardians are strongly encouraged to contact the athletic trainer at any time regarding their student athlete's injury status.
- Remember that ICE and REST are the best treatment for acute injuries until an evaluation by the athletic trainer.
- It is important to remember that once your student athlete sees a physician for an injury/illness (even if the event happened outside of sports), the physician must write a note that allows the athlete to return to play. It is district policy to hold student athletes from participation until the certified athletic trainer receives a note from the physician treating the athlete.

Having a certified athletic trainer on-site at the high school allows for prompt injury assessment and management of any athletic injury, from minor wounds to life threatening emergencies. SENIORS GEAR UP FOR GRADUATION



In the coming weeks there are numerous deadlines and events for seniors prior to their graduation at the Hult Center on Saturday, June 9, 2007.

Any senior who would like to try out to be a speaker at graduation should sign up in the main office by April 13. Those who sign up will be assigned a time to try out during lunch on Tuesday, April 17. Speeches cannot exceed three minutes.

Seniors who would like to perform entertainment at graduation can also sign up in the main office for a tryout slot. They should sign up no later than Friday, April 13. Those performances should not exceed five minutes and they can include vocal or instrumental solos or small groups. The tryouts will be held on Wednesday, April 18, beginning at 3:45 p.m.

Students who sign up for an opportunity to speak or perform will be notified on Monday, April 16 of their tryout time and they will be asked to report to the tryouts at their assigned time ready to try out.

Graduation seating sign-up set for week of April 23-27

Senior who would like to select their own seating for graduation may do so at the counseling counter during the week of April 23. To begin this process, seniors must be certain all of their fees are paid in the finance office, the library and the audiovisual room.

It is imperative all seniors pick up their clearance card in the finance office on or after April 19. This card must be stamped by finance; library and AV indicating no fees are due. Cards must then be presented at the attendance counter before students can select seating. Replacement for any lost cards will begin on April 25.

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SENIORS GEAR UP FOR GRADUATION

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Seniors can also pick up graduation announcements they ordered on Monday, April 23 or Tuesday, April 24 between 10:30-1:30 in the finance office.

Graduation tickets will be sold at SEHS.

All graduates will be able to purchase graduation tickets June 4, 5, and 6 from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. in front of the main office at SEHS. Each senior will be able to get two free tickets and they may purchase an additional three tickets for \$3 each. If students need more tickets, they can return on Thursday, June 7 or Friday, June 8, to purchase up to three more tickets for \$3 each. If you are concerned you might not get enough tickets, call Brenda at SEHS, 687-3527.

Tickets for the senior breakfast will also be sold during this time for \$10 each. The breakfast will be held at the Hilton on graduation morning immediately following graduation practice (9:45-11:30 a.m.) Tickets must be purchased in advance.

In addition, tickets to the all night Senior Party will be sold during this time for \$25 per person. The party will happen after graduation at the U of O Recreation Center.

Caps and gowns will be available June 5 and 6

Seniors can pick up their caps, gowns and tassels in the main office windows on Monday, June 5, or Tuesday, June 6, between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Graduates will bring their caps and gowns to the graduation ceremony. They are asked to report to the front steps at the Hult Center by 6:15 p.m. on Saturday, June 9, for a group photo.
